All stand, as they are able, for the entrance of the ministers of the liturgy, and the opening hymn.




The officiating priest, called the presider, says the following, the people's responses are in bold type.

№ Blessed be God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. **And blessed God's reign, now and for ever. Amen.**

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

All join in singing the Trisagion, an ancient hymn to God.



The Collect of the Day

The presider introduces the Collect of the Day, a prayer which gathers together the thoughts and prayers of the people.

The Lord be with you and also with you. Let us pray.

Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

Amen.

THE LESSONS

The people sit. Readings from the Bible are proclaimed and we share in the gift of God's Word through listening to the scriptures.

The First Reading—Exodus 12:1-4, 11-14

A Reading from the Book of Exodus.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

In the courts of the Lord's house, * in the midst of you, O Jerusalem.


The Second Reading—1 Corinthians 11:23-26

A Reading for the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

For I received from the Lord what I also handed onto you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying. 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The Gospel—John 13:1-17, 31b-35

When the gospel is announced the reader says

The ♣ Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to St. John. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin

and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord - and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them." Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

THE SERMON

After the Gospel the people sit, and one of the ministers gives the sermon, explaining how the lessons relate to our lives.

THE FOOTWASHING

After the sermon, all stand, as they are able, and one of the ministers addresses the people saying

Fellow servants of our Lord Jesus Christ: On the night before his death, Jesus set an example for his disciples by washing their feet, an act of humble service. He taught that strength and growth in the kingdom of God come not by power, authority, or even miracle, but by such lowly service, and he commanded them to follow his example by washing one another's feet.

Therefore I invite all of you who share in the royal priesthood of Christ to come forward, that we may follow the example of our Master, remembering the new commandment that he gave this night, 'Love one another as I have loved you. By this shall the world know that you are my disciples: That you have love for one another.'

All are invited to serve and be served. The people should remove their shoes and socks before coming forward. Be seated in a chair and the person who has just had their feet washed will serve you. After your feet have been washed remain at the station to serve another.

At the conclusion of the foot-washing, one of the ministers says

Lord Jesus Christ, you have taught us that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters we do also for you: give us the will to be the servant of others as you were the servant of all, and gave up your life and died for us, but are alive and reign, now and for ever.

Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

The people stand or kneel, as they are able, and prayers are offered for our own needs and for those of others.

After each petition all join in saying the response

God of love and mercy **Hear our prayer.**

At the end of the prayers the presider adds a concluding Collect.

Confession of Sin

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence may be kept.

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. we are truly sorry and we humbly repent. for the sake of our Savior Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The presider stands and says,

Almighty God # have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life.

Amen.

THE PEACE

All stand, as they are able, and one of the ministers introduces the peace.

Jesus said to his disciples: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid."

The peace of Christ be always with you.

And also with you.

The people greet one another in the name of the Lord.

The Holy Communion

The presider introduces the offertory. An anthem may be sung by the choir as the bread and wine for communion are brought forward. At the start of the hymn, the gifts of the people are brought forward and presented at the altar.





The presider offers the bread and the wine and the gifts of the people back to God, remembering that God is the source of all that we give.

At the Eucharist we are with our crucified and risen Lord. We know that it was not only our ancestors, but we who were redeemed and brought forth from bondage to freedom, from mourning to feasting. We know that as he was with them in the upper room so our Lord is here with us now.

Until the kingdom of God comes let us celebrate this feast.

Blessed are you, Lord, God of the universe, you bring forth bread from the earth.


Blessed be God for ever.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The presider continues



The presider gives thanks for God's faithfulness in creating, sustaining and redeeming humankind.

Then all join in the Sanctus, the song of the angels.



The presider praises God for the salvation of the world through the holy self-giving of Jesus; and remembering the events of the Last Supper, prays that the gifts of bread and wine may become the body and blood of Christ.

Then follows the Memorial Acclamation.

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The presider prays that all may benefit from Christ's holy sacrifice and be renewed by the presence of the Holy Spirit.

At the end of the prayer the people respond




The presider introduces the Lord's Prayer.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread

The presider breaks the consecrated bread. A period of silence is kept, then all join in singing the Fraction Anthem.



All are welcome at the altar. Those not receiving communion are invited to come forward for a prayer of blessing (to indicate this, carry your service booklet forward to the altar). For more information about baptism please speak to the clergy.

THE SOLEMN PRAYER OVER THE PEOPLE


In place of the blessing a Solemn Prayer over the People is used.


Bow down before the Lord.
