St. Thomas By-Laws Article I. Section 2: Voting members shall be limited to members, aged sixteen (16) and above in good standing as defined by the Canons of General Convention of the Episcopal Church. The Episcopal Church sets certain criteria for what constitutes membership. These are outlined in Title I, Canon 17 of the Constitution and Canons:

- 1. All baptized persons, no matter where they were baptized, whose record of baptism is recorded in this church, are considered members of this church.
- 2. All members who have received Holy Communion at least three (3) times during the years are considered communicant members.
- 3. All communicants who for the previous year have "been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and have been faithful working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God" are considered communicants in good standing.

#### Minutes of the 179th Annual Parish Meeting

St. Thomas Episcopal Church of Battle Creek January 30, 2022

Noreen Sidnam, Senior Warden, called the 179th Annual Parish Meeting to order at the beginning of the 10:00 a.m. service.

Noreen asked for a verification of a quorum, Ross Dingwall stated that we have a quorum.

After the reading of the Gospel, Elizabeth Neumeyer offered an opening prayer.

Minutes from the 177th Annual Parish Meeting on January 26, 2020: motion to approve the minutes by Ross Dingwall; support by Keith Phillips; motion approved.

Renewal Works Presentation given by facilitators, Kathy Dingwall & Elizabeth Schirk.

#### **Election of Vestry Members and Convention Delegates:**

Noreen called for the ratification of the 2021 candidates for three-year terms: Kent Bieberich, Doug Chapel, and Bernie Squires and Karen Keese, a two-year delegate to convention . Noreen presented the slate for the election of vestry members and convention delegates. Three candidates for three-year terms on the vestry: Kathy Dingwall, Charles Grantier, and Franz Schirk. The candidate for a two-year term is John Lendel. 1 delegate to diocesan convention (two-year term): John Lendel. Mo-tion to approve the candidates for vestry and delegates to diocesan convention by acclamation by Lori Kiess; support by Jodi Nickerson; motion approved. Candidates elected by acclamation.

**Proposed amendments to the parish by-laws** were moved by the Vestry and recommended for adoption. Motion made to approve by Keith Phillips, second by Kent Bieberich; motion approved.

#### **Reports:**

**Budget & Finance:** Dave Disler, Treasurer, noted that the 2022 budget approved by the vestry was in the packet. He also noted that the 2021 end-of-year financial reports were not included due to a family emergency. Those reports will be forwarded to the parish when he receives them.

Bob Harberts, trustee of the St. Thomas Endowment and chair of the Trust Investment Committee clarified the following: The Nickerson bequest is not designated as a fund of the endowment to be used for building repairs such as the chapel restoration, the Stewardship and Fundraising Report in the 2021 Annual Report and Ministry Review, notwithstanding. The trustees and the Stewardship and Fundraising Commission of the Vestry will work together on any disbursements from this fund.

**Property:** Hans Prechtel, Junior Warden, pointed out that the rose window restoration has been completed and hopes to continue restoring other stained-glass windows. He thanked all those who helped with the building in the past year.

**Vestry:** Noreen Sidnam, Senior Warden, thanked the vestry for its hard work during a very difficult year. She thanked all who served on the vestry and noted her pleasure with the RenewalWorks process and plans.

Dave Disler commended Noreen for her service as senior warden.

**State of the Parish Report:** Father Brian Coleman, Rector, stated that his report was included in the Annual Report.

The meeting concluded with the singing of a hymn and a closing prayer by Noreen Sidnam.

The service continued with the Eucharist.

## STATE OF THE PARISH REPORT

2022 was an exceptionally fruitful year for St. Thomas, despite the personal challenges that I have faced throughout as a result of my vocal cord paralysis. The year began with the introduction of the Reverends Rick Stravers and Heather Barta who served as our supply clergy during my disability from January through March. Rick and Heather were warmly received by the congregation and brought new insights and wisdom through their preaching, pastoral care and liturgical leadership. Much of the early part of the year was also spent getting back to normal, as much as possible, in the wake of the ongoing pandemic.

Upon my return to work we were devastated with the news of the sudden and tragic death of our beloved, Julian Mansfield, great-grandson of Roy and Brenda Hillman. On the other end of the spectrum of life we bid farewell to long-time and active members Paul and Gretchen Humiston who died within weeks of each other. These losses, among others, were keenly felt by the parish and we will forever cherish their memory.

Also early in 2022 St. Thomas received a massive infusion of cash (over \$500,000) into the St. Thomas Endowment Fund, thanks to the generosity and wise stewardship of Ralph and Audra Nickerson. Audra died late in 2021 after a brief illness. She had served faithfully as a deacon at St. Thomas in the past and helped to fund the elevator which was dedicated in memory of her husband.

About mid-way through the year, it became clear despite the remarkable gift to our endowment that our operating expenses were going to outpace our yearly income and parishioners responded generously and with tremendous faith. Through our St. Thomas Booster campaign we were able to raise approximately \$15,000 to offset unplanned expenses.

I am very proud of the fact that throughout the pandemic we have been able to maintain uninterrupted our service to the hungry and homeless through our breakfast and holiday basket programs. In 2022 we were able to finally resume in-person dining at the breakfast program which will again provide much needed opportunities for socializing and developing relationships for this vulnerable population. We also continued our holiday basket program in collaboration with Santa's Helper enabling St. Thomas to reach many more people more efficiently.

2022 saw the arrival of our Bishop Provisional, the Rt. Rev. Prince Singh, who we had a chance to meet online and in person on several occasions upon his arrival and who presided beautifully at the church service on December 18th, leading the ending of a pastoral relationship liturgy.

At the end of May it became clear to me that due to my vocal limitations I would not be able to sustain full-time ministry indefinitely and I made the announcement that I intended to step down from active ministry by the end of the year. I called a Special Parish Meeting in June to present parish financial reports for the previous year, discuss my disability plans, and to hear from our Canon Missioner about the transition process.

On a much happier note, our sister Trish Harris was ordained to the Sacred Order of Deacons and began serving St. Thomas in the Summer. She brings a beautiful spirit and considerable gifts to our parish and the wider community. For me, personally, it has been a great joy to see her develop from her baptism back in 2012, through her confirmation, marriage, and ordination. What a wonderful gift to St. Thomas she will continue to be.

In July I attended the General Convention of the Episcopal Church where much progress was made in addressing past injustices, particularly against indigenous peoples, and establishing a more sustainable path forward for our denomination. This was the third and last time that I served as an elected deputy from our diocese.

Early in the Autumn we began again in earnest to work through our *RenewalWorks* initiatives: Parish Prayer, Rule of Life, Instructed Eucharist and Community Collaboration. The first two of these initiatives were presented on Sunday mornings to the congregation and the others will be discussed and acted on in 2023. I am immensely proud of the lay-led efforts that have and will continue to bear much fruit in our parish.

Our annual giving campaign, *More Than Enough*, was hugely successful, and we exceeded our pledge goal for 2023 by over \$15,000. This puts St. Thomas is a good position going forward into the transition, and the financial viability of the parish will no doubt be an attractive feature to any possible future rectors.

The real theme of the past year has been the remarkable stepping up of lay leaders to sustain and support our ongoing ministry during the time of transition. I am so encouraged and deeply impressed at the way that you have all offered your gifts of time, talent and treasure to further the work of the Gospel.

I have endeavored to leave St. Thomas in a healthy and wholesome way. Admittedly this has been a long good-bye, but I think that it has been a good good-bye too. Thank you for the beautiful gifts given to me and John at our leaving celebrations, for your generosity in providing us with a financial purse. It has been my honor and privilege to serve you, and I will always have a special place in my prayers and in my heart for St. Thomas.

#### WORSHIP

Worship is at the center of our faith community helping us to strengthen our relationships with God and with each other in our daily lives.

As a church, worship is our primary outreach. We offer prayer and praise for and on behalf of the wider community. At St. Thomas our worship engages all our senses and is enriched by the grandeur of our buildings, the dignity of our liturgies and beautiful music. We keep the feasts of the Christian Calendar and our lives are shaped by the seasons of the liturgical year.

#### In worship we:

*Proclaim* — We show forth the Good News of the Gospel through preaching, music, liturgy, scripture readings and prayer:

*Celebrate — We regularly gather at the Lord's Table to participate in the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood. Though many, we are one body because we all share in one bread, one cup:* 

*Experience* — *We worship God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, conscious of both the presence and transcendence of God.* 

#### Acolytes

The ministry of the acolyte is a serving ministry of the Church that comes from ancient times. From those days until now acolytes have been faithful and conscientious persons who serve as part of the liturgy and Holy Eucharist and find a place serving God at the altar. It is an honor to be one who serves, and, truly a vital ministry to God and God's people.

It is likely you've noticed the ramping up of acolyte service throughout 2022. After adjustments made during the pandemic, it has been refreshing, humbling, and an honor to continue in the ministry of serving as an acolyte. We have all learned new ways of serving in the same role as we grapple with what is next for our parish. As a team we are called to step up in new ways and drop back in others, as the needs shift. Through it all, I remain blessed to lead (although I don't see it as leader-ship, but rather fellowship and community), such a patient, kind and accommodating group of individuals. As with any task, we grow through the challenges and I can attest to the personal growth I have gained in my service. Without my place on this team, I would have missed what I see as necessary growth and the deepening of relationships as well as broadening my understanding of what being in communion with one another truly means.

We currently are a very small team and are in need of those that feel called to involvement in a rewarding role, even if it seems out of reach. I promise to train and make anyone comfortable to serve in this capacity. Some of the team, because of varying circumstances; health, career, and other "life things", have needed to step back for now, leaving an opportunity for others to fill those rewarding roles. The current "handful" of people (~ 5 depending on the "level" of service and liturgical calendar) are filling the concentrated but consistent roles of Crucifer, Sub-Deacon, and Thurifer. I hope to have those that are eager to serve again, in 2023. One unfortunate thing I've discovered about myself, through service, is that, while I love the acolyte rolls, I am not great at recruiting, as I believe this is personal discernment process, but hope those reading this will feel led to consider joining this ministry.

#### Prayerful Call to Action: Roles, Responsibilities and Participants:

Acolytes serve at each of the weekly services, including Evensong services. The diverse talent and

flexibility of this team is truly great and being a part of such a team is a humbling and fulfilling experience. The weekly Crucifers and Sub-Deacons currently include: Jodi Nickerson, Hans Prechtel, Karmel Addis, and Becky Squires. In 2022, Keith Philips and Val Miller, both valued members of our team will not be able to serve moving forward. Mark Olmstead graciously agrees to serve "in a pinch" as Thurifer, and Charles Grantier has been dependable as the crucifer for Evensong services. When available and with a little coercion (I tend to have some but not much persuasion with them), Claire, Apollo, and Quinn Nickerson have also served a handful of times in 2022. Mahkhi and Aleise Carpenter, Kellan, and Grady Petronsky are in training as torches and eager to get started. There may be others I've forgotten to mention who have participated and/or stepped up throughout the year, and if you are one of these folks, please know you are greatly appreciated.

While assisting the Clergy in various roles, blending into our worship experience, lighting candles, and ensuring the space is prepared for all parishioners to worship, our God is glorified as each acolyte brings their own personality and knowledge of tasks to complete each responsibility with reverence and also with fun. Knowing reverence is important, we strive to make serving an experience that is fulfilling, centering, and exciting. The Acolyte team contributes to the vast vitality of our parish through its weekly service. Knowledge, focus, and flexibility are a few of the qualities required of an Acolyte for each Eucharist and Evensong at which they serve. These qualities can enhance the desire to serve, not only our parish each week, but also in our schools, places of employment, homes, and other outreach opportunities. Additionally, I know that it has inspired a heart for service in many of the young people who participate in the program. We are building a team that enjoys service and strives to understand why we "do what we do." Our hope is for sustained growth in 2023, both in numbers and depth of understanding.

#### AV Tech Team

The Audio-Visual Tech Team is responsible for the livestreaming of the services in the Sanctuary: we move the cameras, add captions to label the different parts of the service, and hit the all-important "Go Live" button. When needed, we also help set up the three alternate worship spaces, the Chapel, the Lounge, and the Parish Hall. Team members serve at one or two services each month to help get our message out to the world: to our members watching from home to members who have moved or are traveling, and to anyone curious about what we have to offer.

While we deal with very technical aspects of the service, the job gives us the chance to be the eyes and ears of the congregation. We get to know the order of service intimately; we highlight the offerings of everyone in the service. I love that team members get to be expressive in choosing whether to zoom in on a participant, or keeping a wide shot to show the whole church community. We get to share our worship with the world.

In 2022, our members have added more of the Audio aspects of the services to our responsibilities. All of the handheld, lapel, and area microphones can be adjusted to the needs of different speakers and singers, so we have had a more hands-on experience with this part of the technology. New team members will start their training with just the visual aspects and will add audio as they get more comfortable.

This year our members streamed over 100 services to our YouTube and Facebook channels. Our team members are Franz Schirk, Joerg Himmelreich, Laurel Stravers, and Karmel Addis. We would love another member or two to join our team! If you're interested in this cool, behind-the-scenes role, I'd love to get you trained and shadowing a service!

#### Deacon

In June 2022, I was ordained a vocational deacon in The Episcopal Church. Bishop Provisional Prince Singh assigned me to the St. Thomas parish in Battle Creek, MI with the understanding that the work I engage in is for The Episcopal Church at large, and if there are needs that arise that are away from the Battle Creek area, I may spend time and energy in other areas besides the St. Thomas parish.

The following is a snapshot of the services that I have been engaged in over the last seven months:

- Offered a Vigil for Healing & Hope after the Roe v. Wade overturn.
- Gathered a group to march in the Battle Creek Pride Parade .
- Serving as a member of the TEMP team in Battle Creek to ensure that everyone has sufficient shelter when the temperatures are at a level to pose safety risks.
- Serving as a member of the World in Prayer team & write prayers on a rotating basis which are posted on the World in Prayer website and sent to thousands of subscribers each week.
- Facilitating a weekly Life Skills class at the Share Center, a drop-in center in Battle Creek for people struggling with homelessness, addiction, and mental health issues. There is currently one parishioner who attends the class and assists in leading.
- Working a weekly shift at Ministry with Community, a drop-in center in Kalamazoo for people struggling with homelessness, addiction, and mental health issues. I assist them with doing their laundry, clean the showers and escort them to a clean shower, and assist them in a variety of ways to include fostering relationships.
- Officiating Evening Prayer once a week.
- Leading Spiritual Chat and Compline once a week.
- Visiting parishioners and other people who are ill or struggling with life issues.
- Bringing home communion to people unable to get to church for a variety of reasons
- Presented at a break-out session at the annual diocesan convention regarding Deacons Taking it to the Streets.
- Serving on the Pastoral Care team.
- Serving at the altar during liturgical services to include baptisms, and funerals.

Recent additions to my schedule are meetings with a couple whose wedding I will officiate in May, preparing to serve on the Deacon's Council, and assisting the Commission on Ministry in June in order to interview candidates for the diaconate.

#### Lectors & Intercessors

Lectors are primarily responsible for reading and leading the Old Testament (first lesson) readings at Holy Eucharist and often at Sunday Evensongs. The lector typically reads the lesson and may also lead the psalm. The New Testament scripture, or second lesson, is typically read by the sub deacon. The lessons follow the church calendar using a three-year cycle and can be found on *The Lectionary Page* online or in *Preparing for Sunday* on our website.

This year, the Vestry's *Parish Growth and Development Committee* has focused on ways to make people feel comfortable and welcome, especially during the Holy Eucharist when pieces of the liturgy may be new and hard to understand. As part of that initiative, we have added a prologue to the readings. The idea is to help make the scripture more meaningful by front-loading some background information relating to it. As expected, it has been appreciated by more than just the newcomers!

The prayers and intercessions follow the formats found in *The Book of Common Prayer*. As intercessors, it's important to make our prayers less rote and more personal by moderating tone of voice and pace; for that reason, many intercessors write their own prayers.

As a member of this ministry, it's possible to choose to be a lector or an intercessor or both. Scheduling is done monthly, and we are looking at ways to accommodate the calendars of all those who are part of this important and rewarding ministry.

## Youth

We are called to nurture our children through teaching them about the Gospel and of God's eternal love for them and all creation. We seek to help our children grow in the knowledge and love of God, to increase in faith, and to love whatever is just and true and good.

We also recognize that children have gifts to offer us and our community by their presence, their questions, their honesty, and their special, intuitive sense of God.

Our work with young people includes:

*Education* — *We provide a safe and nurturing environment for learning meaningful and relevant lessons about God's love and Christ's mission to our world.* 

*Music* — We offer a spirited environment where music is embraced, studied and celebrated as a gift from God, and where children are encouraged to offer their prayers and praise to God.

*Ministry* — We challenge our youth to use their talents in the service of God and others through church activities and in the wider community.

#### **Breakfast Book Club**

We have offered a series of free books including Bibles and various devotional books for children and adults for about seven years. My original purpose was to make sure children had educational materials. I also include flash cards, pencils, and notebooks. The adults also like the latter. Due to COVID restrictions, this has not been utilized as much. However, I do need to keep replenishing the workbooks and flash cards. The other popular item is the small Gideon New Testament with Psalms and Proverbs. I get these from a bookstore called the Blue Vase in Interlochen, Michigan. I have given out at least 75 throughout the year. I also added a little booklet called The Little Black Book of Scriptures as well as the Little Red Book. These are very popular too. I have given out at least 80 of the Little Book. I think it is the small size of these items that is appealing since the homeless person can put it in their pocket and those with a small apartment don't have to take up much room. This year Kiwanis gave me \$300.00 to get workbooks for little ones. I concentrated on phonics, math, and language arts for PreK to Kindergarten. However, next year I recommended that Kiwanis give the monies to the After School Reading Program at 2<sup>nd</sup> Missionary Baptist Church. Thelma Vaughn runs the program and I also invited her to come over and choose books because I have too many now. She took a selection of the I Can Read series so they are getting out to more children. A thank you to parishioners who donate books, flash cards and other items. I plan to continue this program because it seems to work in spite of COVID.

#### Post Franklin Food-Pack Program

Again in 2022, St. Thomas has had the opportunity to support the Food-Pack Program as part of our outreach to the children of our community. Together with First United Methodist, First Congregational, and St. Philip Catholic Church, Hans Prechtel, Bernie Squires, and I coordinate the delivery of food packs on Thursdays during the school year. Each church contributes approximately \$1000 to the purchase of the food packs from the Food Bank of Southwest Michigan and then delivers the packs to the school.

The packs provide the students and their families with some nutritious food for the weekend when school meals are not available. As of December 19, 2022, we, along with the other 3 churches, delivered more than 1000 food packs to the very grateful students at Post Franklin School for the year 2022. The contents varied but could include cereal, canned fruit/vegetables, canned pasta, juice, canned milk, peanut butter, and healthy snacks. This is a project that involves very little time but has a big impact on the children who may not have food for the weekend.

With grants difficult to maintain and the inflation factor, increasing individual church support is going to be paramount to the continued success of this very vital program. We will be looking for ways to increase our parish financial support and hope you will think of ways you can contribute.

#### **Sunday School**

Formal Sunday school and youth-focused programs at St Thomas continued to be on pause in 2022, but that didn't mean we weren't also looking for important ways to support our young people over the past year.

In January, 2022, the Episcopal Dioceses of Eastern & Western Michigan announced the appointments of part-time members of the diocesan staff who would take on roles related to youth ministries with Father Joel Turmo serving 23 churches in the southern region including St. Thomas.

In April, 2022, Judy Gray and Lori Kiess attended the Regional Meeting on Children & Youth Formation via zoom where we had the opportunity to share our hopes and our concerns for our programs, loss of teachers and shortages of volunteers with dwindling class sizes, especially with the hard impact of the COVID pandemic when in-person classes were not possible. We learned that many congregations find themsselves in a place much like we are, with their Sunday school programs on pause, slow to recover, and looking for volunteers and ideas to help take the lead to get them restarted in some form.

We were hopeful that we might be able to combine resources with other churches, bringing our kids together for outings, retreats or camps. The missing piece in seeing this come to fruition however continued to be the lack of dedicated coordinators or youth leaders to pull it all together. We are not without hope and Lori Kiess will be attending another Regional zoom meeting this month where we expect some of these ideas will be revisited and perhaps put into action. While not able to lead the youth program, Lori and others will continue to gather and share as much information as possible.

Another new children and youth-oriented offering came this past year from the Congregational Growth

and Development Committee who began providing baskets of small religious-based coloring books and crayons at each entrance where greeters and ushers could hand them out to our little visitors; a wonderful way to extend our hospitality and make their time with us on Sunday even more enjoyable.

And throughout the year at the Sunday 5:00 pm services, St. Thomas offered youth-focused programs where fun and fellowship was shared along with the Eucharist. Deacon Trish Harris led two of the services and assisted in several more. When asked what meaningful experiences she had at these services, she replied that it was very special being part of ..."the small group gathering together at the altar and sharing in communion. Fr. Brian took the time to share about the meaning of the Eucharist and the sacred space it holds in our faith tradition. Children were engaged "close up" and could touch & taste the body of Christ in a way that's different from Sunday morning. It was also a lot of fun making pizza & listening to 5-8 year olds in conversation, building relationships with one another!".

We're not sure what the next steps will be for our youth programs and we continue to desperately need volunteers to step up and lead the way. Be assured, we're prepared to heartily support those individuals in this ministry.

#### Communications

St. Thomas has been using consistent communications tools for many years. Utilizing the website, email, Realm, YouTube and Facebook have transformed the way people interact with the congregation.

The St. Thomas website <u>StThomasBC.org</u> received 1,727 unique visitors with is down 3%. Our website is hosted by Wix which provides all the software and editing capabilities online, so at any given time, anyone can log in and update the website with the login and password. This is important for any congregation to have easily-accessible editing capability if one person should no longer be able to continue managing website changes. New pages are added to reflect the changing events and dynamics happening in the congregation.

The United States Postal Service has begun requiring bulk mail to be digitally-processed, so mailing parish letters and newsletters has been outsourced to a local company. This company both prints the letters and processes the mailing at the same time.

Constant Contact email marketing has been utilized at St. Thomas since 2009 and continues to be a great way to send announcements, links to worship text and marketing campaigns, such as the steward-ship campaign. Emails go to members and non-members alike, with a total of 356 contacts who receive St. Thomas e-news and public announcements..

The communications work of St. Thomas has been enhanced by the work of the Audio Video Team, spearheaded by Alexis Stark, who has submitted a separate report. Their work with AV technology creates stored videos of each worship service on YouTube, which can be edited for specific sermons, use on our website, or training purposes.

The NewSpirit has been St. Thomas's print newsletter for decades, and continues to be published quarterly. The congregation submits articles, photos and announcements, and it is very much a living history of the life of the congregation.

#### **Holiday Food Baskets**

The Holiday Food Basket program of St Thomas is a ministry dedicated to serving those in need within our community. We arrange to supply food for Thanksgiving as well as Christmas.

St Thomas prepared food boxes and arranged for delivery or pickup for 72 households the Saturday prior to Thanksgiving.

For Christmas, we partnered with Santa's Helper to reach more families while keeping our costs down. Santa's Helpers purchased all the food for Christmas in return for the use of the former "PRIDE" room, which they used for food storage (St Thomas also covered the cost of electricity for their freezers that operated the two months of the year).

When it came to issue the food on December 17th, St Thomas volunteers loaded and delivered boxes for 18 families while Santa's Helpers handled issuing food for nearly 240 additional families that came to pick up the boxes from St Thomas.

We will meet with the leader of Santa's Helper in early 2023 and determine if we should renew our partnership for 2023 (probable) and identify process improvements if indeed we continue our partnership.

We were able to serve so many people because of the great support we had from the Parish. In addition to the donations of parishioners, our volunteers served to call families with instructions for pickup/deliveries, to order food, to pack the food boxes, and to help with deliveries/pickups. Our volunteers performed in an outstanding manner while making the effort enjoyable for all.

It is sad to note that this was the final year of two leaders who have made this program possible. Fr. Brian Coleman has been an ardent supporter of this outreach program and Bob Harberts has been leading the organization of this successful program for many years. It was their leadership initiative that led us to the partnership with Santa's Helpers which has helped St Thomas brighten the lives of many more households during Thanksgiving and Christmas.

A highlight of the year has been the continuation of bringing together the senior women of the parish that had been the group known as the Companions. Emilie Cummins, as part of the Pastoral Care Team has facilitated this with phone calls, visits, and providing transportation and arranging places to meet. There have been restaurant meets for birthdays, as well as restarting regular meetings of the Companions. Fr. Brian recommended a book for the group to self-study that is titled The Path. It provides a Bible Study each month for the group to focus on.

Another highlight of 2022 was Fr. Brian conducting a training for the Pastoral Care Team. He went through the reasons and process for taking the Eucharist out of the church and into the home or hospital. He took us around in the Sacristy and showed us where everything was housed and how to pull a kit together. Church policy now is 2 people should go together to give communion. There are now 3 Lay Eucharistic Ministers who can give communion and the rest of the Pastoral Care Team is available to provide the 2<sup>nd</sup> person. Hans Prechtel, Deacon Trish Harris, and Karen Keese are now Lay Eucharistic Ministers. A request to the office will be sent to the team.

Each month, Linda Morrison sends out birthday and anniversary cards. Any donations of stamps are very welcome.

We currently have 2 parishioners in Rehab or Assisted Living and several mostly homebound or marginal as to whether they can get out to church. We will be taking the Eucharist once a month to them and keeping them in touch by phone or visits. We send notes and cards too. We also visit.

We know there are others in the parish who also contribute to our mission, by phone calls and visits and supplies (stamps and cards). We thank you for all you do!

We meet monthly except for December or bad weather, illness etc. Our membership this year is Deacon Trish Harris, Emilie Cummins, Kyle Lendel, Linda Morrison, Karen Keese, and welcome to Elizabeth Schirk. Our principle function is to plan, prepare and serve funeral luncheons. This year, funeral receptions were prepared for Julian Mansfield, Paul and Gretchen Humiston, and Genevieve Young. Families are asked to reimburse the cost of the food.

We are also available for other reception type functions of the Parish. Our ministry is clearly one of service. We are honored to be able to provide this service to families of our treasured members.

On December 11, 2022, we arranged for a catered luncheon for the parish at the request of the Vestry, giving all an opportunity to bid farewell to Father Brian. Sandwiches and salads were purchased from Schlotzkey's in Battle Creek. The reception committee provided the cake purchased from Continental Bakery. We had serving assistance from the Harper Creek High School National Honor Society; the Reception Committee will make a donation to NHS.

After the service of Lesson and Carols on December 18, 2022, we hosted a community reception for Father Brian, giving members of the community an opportunity to wish him well. Carol Ritchie provided catering support and knowledge assisted by the Reception Committee and friends of the committee.

This committee is not funded by the Parish budget. We are funded only by donations to the restricted account for this purpose. We are grateful for the support which enables us to continue to provide this ministry. This year it was necessary to purchase some new tablecloths to replace those unfit for service.

#### RenewalWorks

At our last Annual Saint Thomas Parish Meeting in January 2022, the Renewal/Works Team went through a series of workshops, learned the objectives of the Renewal/Works program, studied the St. Thomas survey data, and developed four key initiatives that we hoped would help move us - individually and as a congregation – closer to God.

Since that time, the Renewal/Works committee has been busy more fully developing each of the initiatives. To facilitate the work, we separated into four smaller working groups, one each to further the four initiatives. Following are the reports of each of the groups.

1. Develop a Saint Thomas Parish Prayer (Liz Neumeyer, Karen Keese, Sue Shafe, Ross Dingwall)

The *Prayer Group* met multiple times in 2022 to complete the following initiative developed by the Renewal Works Team. We were to create a parish prayer and incorporate scripture reading to be used before any parish meeting. We first explored how many groups already did this. We found that the Vestry, St. Mary's Circle, St. Margaret's Circle, and the Altar Guild had prayers. We agreed that these groups should continue with their prayers but that other church groups should begin with a prayer.

The *Prayer Group* developed several and decided to include scripture right in the prayer itself. However, then we looked at other circumstances that might require prayer such as entering church or at home such as meals. So we began to write others. Ross requested one specifically for church yard work, construction meeting, and so on informally known as "The Dirt Prayer." Because St. Margaret's Circle always had a closing prayer, we were inspired to develop several of those using the words and experiences of our Patronal St. Thomas. Even though St. Margaret's Circle has discontinued, we thank them for this idea.

We also felt that many prayers are already in the Book of Common Prayer (BCP) and parishioners be reacquainted with them as well as encourage them to have a BCP of their own at home. A full report with all the prayers (including Large Print) was provided. Future plans include meeting with Karmel and putting some of the prayers on pocket size cards to ensure ease of availability and use. Another plan is to continue to emphasize the prayers as part of a Lenten discussion group along with the Rule of Life.

#### II. Develop a Saint Thomas Rule of Life - (Trish Harris, Liz Neumeyer, Franz Schirk)

As tasked by the RenewalWorks team, the *Rule of Life* working group set out to develop a Rule of Life to help the Saint Thomas congregation achieve the RenewalWorks goal of fostering a church cul-

ture devoted to strengthening our spiritual growth in the love of God and our neighbor.

The Rule was to be a guide to the St. Thomas family as a whole and a starting point for each of us to develop a personal Rule of Life. Its elements had to be based in scripture and it had to provide a shared routine of spiritual practices to establish and maintain a relationship with God.

On Sunday, November 13, 2022, after much research, discussion, reflection, and prayer the group proposed the following Rule to the congregation:

#### With the help of God, St. Thomas parishioners will strive, as able, to:

- 1. Pray and worship regularly. "Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing." (Thess. 5: 16)
- 2. Serve and share generously. "Do not forget to do good and to share, for with such sacrifices, God is well pleased." (Hebrews 13: 16)
- 3. **Promote and practice hospitality**. "Contribute to the needs of saints, extend hospitality" (Romans 12: 13)
- 4. Explore and apply scripture. "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." (Psalms 119: 105).
- 5. Rest and restore body and mind. "Come to me, all you that are weary, and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11: 28)

In the coming year, as part of the overall RenewalWorks project the *St. Thomas Rule of Life* will be consolidated with the products from the other working groups and published in booklet form as well as on the St. Thomas web site. We will also include additional reference and resource materials to assist us all in merging our individual Rules into a harmonious whole. As it says elsewhere: *E pluribus unum*.

#### III. Instructed Eucharist - (Hans Prechtel, Judy Gray, Kent Bieberich, Brenda Hillman)

The Instructed Eucharist working group has developed a presentation consisting of two parts.

- A. A sermon on the history of the Eucharist, tracing its development from the time of Jesus and the disciples to the present day. The sermon is ready for presentation at any time, pending coordination with Fr. Rick.
- B. Prepared for an actual instructed Eucharist to be conducted on two consecutive Sundays during Lent 2023. We have yet to talk with Fr. Rick as far as the Eucharist itself is concerned (will do that in January).
- IV. Connect with Other Churches (Bob Harberts, Barb Hibiske, John Lendel)

<u>Mission Statement:</u> Expanding God's works and living in God's love through connecting with other churches and religious organizations to discuss and develop cooperative programs through closer relationships and shared experiences.

The three-member committee has held several meetings via Zoom. Its first assignment was to develop an Inventory of the current and past activities that involved St. Thomas with other churches. The inventory listed at least twenty cooperative endeavors involving St. Thomas and other churches or organizations. Each of the three committee members interviewed key church members to obtain the information found in the Inventory. The list is impressive. It illustrates many cooperative ventures involving St. Thomas and various churches.

<u>Committee Activities:</u> The committee reviewed the Inventory with the intent of finding current and past activities that would connect St. Thomas with other area churches while propelling St. Thomas forward along its spiritual journey. The committee also engaged in brainstorming to create items not in the Inventory. The committee members have agreed upon nine activities that they believe will assist with achieving its Mission. These items are as follows:

#### Possible Activities Prioritized:

Priority One List:

- 1. Explore and implement a Youth Vacation Bible School involving two to four Battle Creek Churches. Implementation date: 2024.
- 2. Explore and implement a joint evening Advent worship service involving two or more Battle Creek Churches. A social time will follow the service. Implementation date: 2023 or 2024.
- 3. Explore and implement a joint Good Friday worship service involving two or more Battle Creek Churches. Implementation date: 2023 or 2024.
- 4. Explore and implement ways for the congregation to develop joint ventures that are independent of the items listed in this report and will achieve the Mission Statement. Also be open to modifying the selected items based on the input from the other churches and religious organizations. Be receptive to long-term projects and relationships.
- 5. Explore opportunities related to our Mission Statement with St. Gregory's Abbey of Three Rivers, Abbott Andrew; St. Elias Orthodox Church; Order of Julian of Norwich—These organizations are in addition to central city churches previously discussed. Implementation date: 2023—2025. Note: The list of churches and organizations may be too ambitious.

Priority Two List:

- 1. Explore and implement the use of the Episcopal Church Summer Camp for a camping experience for students from at least three area churches. Implementation date: 2023 or 2024.
- 2. Explore and implement a program that would involve downtown churches coordinating and tracking services provided to the needy seeking assistance from the churches. Parttime staff would be required and funding would need to be obtained. Implementation date: 2024.
- 3. Encourage and support St. Thomas music programs that involve other churches. Implementation date: 2023.
- 3. Explore with the St. Thomas Boy Scout troop activities that the troop could engage in to promote a youth connection with other churches. Implementation date: 2023 or 2024. Explore with Heather Wiley and her Girl Scout Troupes. Implementation Date: 2023—2024.

#### Next Steps:

- 1. The Committee will meet in January or February to reduce the list to fewer items.
- 2. The Committee will meet with the clergy of at least two downtown churches to discuss the feasibility of the Mission Statement and the selected items listed. These meetings will occur before the end of April.
- 3. After the information is gathered, it will be shared with the congregation around August or

sooner.

4. The congregation can help the Committee by sharing recommendations as to the downtown churches that they feel we should visit first.

#### Senior Warden's Report

What can I say about 2022? When I think about that question, those often quoted words of Charles Dickens spring to mind — "*It was the best of times, it was the worst of times...*" To illustrate these words — in February, we began to address building issues pushed aside for lack of money, and we hired a fantastic bookkeeper to rectify our accounts and balance the budget; but, in March, we implemented accommodations to allow Fr. Brian the necessary pain relief to continue his role as our rector and by May, we learned that the accommodations weren't enough, and Fr. Brian would resign within a year.

From that time forward, we sprinted between those two superlative words. We implemented a successful Booster Campaign to offset a \$15,000 budget deficit; began climbing the steps to hiring clergy supply, an interim, and finally a new rector; and at the same time, planned how to say good-bye to a rector whom we loved. Along the way, the vestry grappled with several unanticipated resignations and illnesses — and dealt with the sad passing of dear, old friends as well as the sudden and tragic loss of an 8-year-old boy whose laughter still filled our hearts. *RenewalWorks* stepped in with plans and presentations aimed at bringing us together in prayer and spirit while the committee for *Parish Growth & Development* showed us ways to make people feel more comfortable and welcome.

Despite the sadness that seemed to hang over us with the departure of Fr. Brian growing closer, there were some wonderful things happening. In November, the grace-filled mural given to us by Bob Hibbard in memory of his beloved Shirley was revealed as the missing piece in our beautiful sanctuary. In December, the support of Bishop Singh and the Canon James, both of whom will guide us through this difficult transition, became a tangible assurance; and the awareness of the strength and confidence that we had gained over the past fourteen years was beginning to show us that we could navigate this

unknown path together. We have only to rely on what Fr. Brian has taught us — that we will survive because we know how to face a challenge and come out the other side better than ever. We have the will and the faith in ourselves and in God to step into the future.

I am proud to be your senior warden, and I will always try to support you on our journey.

We have made considerable progress this year toward making this change, and we will continue with your help and input. The following is a list of the projects that have been addressed this year.

- 1. Repair & strengthened the Van Buren Chapel door.
- 2. Cleaned and refreshed the sanctuary carpet.
- 3. Installed new LED lighting fixture in front entrance & hallway.
- 4. Installed new LED lamps above the front of the altar.
- 5. Worked toward employing a new cleaning service.
- 6. Updated boiler inspection for current license.
- 7. Tested for backflow prevention.
- 8. Completed the installation of a new flat roof over the upper (parish hall & Sunday school and lower (lounge & offices) parts of the building.
- 9. Began a multi-year Chapel Restoration project.

#### **Commission Reports**

#### **Parish Growth & Development**

Parish Growth and Development (PGD) has been very busy in 2022. There have been lots of exciting things happening and here are a few of the highlights noted below:

WELCOME PROCESS FOR VISITORS TO ST. THOMAS. We identify the newcomer (asking for assistance from greeters, ushers, vestry members, parish members, PGD or Priest). The vestry liaison each Sunday during announcements will welcome newcomers and remind them of the welcome card in the pew to fill out and return to anyone in the church. A welcome basket that Sunday will be given to the newcomer and invited to coffee hour & introduced to other parish members. The welcome card information is then entered into Realm and a letter from the church is sent to the newcomer, inviting them back to church & future contact is offered. The welcome card is filed and a follow up process is followed, which is outlined in Realm (with a timeline for the process), to include welcome letter, phone call, tote bag may be given and/or special event invitations. Also, we are looking into including on our website FAQs for newcomers with information about our church that they might find useful.

**HOSPITALITY AUDIT** (*TOOLS OF THE TRADE*) St. Thomas engaged in a hospitality audit this year. This process was very helpful to us in looking at ways to work on strategies to make our visitors feel welcome at our church. This process will be ongoing into 2023 as well. There are 9 *Tools of The Trade* and they are as follows:

- 1) Connection
- 2) Sweet Tunes
- 3) Bread of Life and Forgiveness
- 4) Tasty Treats
- 5) Proclamation
- 6) Tenderness
- 7) Seeing God in Everyone
- 8) The Good Book
- 9) Thanksgiving.

Some of the following have already been accomplished:

- Karen Keese continues to fill welcome baskets and remind everyone on the committee where they are located and to hand them out to a newcomer the same day they arrive at church. We set baskets with small kits for children by the front and back of the sanctuary that the ushers and greeters can offer to families with children.
- Name tags have been put out again in the hallway, and on Sundays. the vestry liaison encourages everyone to put on a nametag. This helps newcomers know who people are in the church.
- Each lector will provide a summary before each Lesson from the book, "Introducing the Lessons of the Church," by author Frederick Borsch.

• Each committee member will work on at least 1 of the 9 *Tools of the Trade* over the course of 2023 to expand and strengthen our wide-open welcome.

#### **Outreach & Facility Management**

As we began 2022, the commission, which includes John Lendel (Jr. Warden), Hans Prechtel, Franz Schirk, Ross Dingwall, Roy Hillman, Lori Kiess, and Mike Regner decided to take on multiple projects to improve, repair, and save our historic downtown church. We knew that we had our hands full with the number of projects that needed to be done. With prayer and God's help we moved forward.

Bids for the repair of the upper and lower flat roofs (including the elevator) were received. Meetings were held with the various contractors, and we accepted the bid from Tichenor with a 10-year work-manship and 20-year materials warranty. The job took a little over two weeks and with the good weather this fall, they were able to complete the roofs before the first snow.

Motor Shop Electric installed new LED lighting fixtures in the upstairs hallway and installed LED bulbs in the lights at the front of the altar. They will be back to install new bulbs in the stairway as we continue to work on lighting improvements that may also impact the energy bill in the future.

The commission also worked hard to maintain the grounds around the church. This has included the southside flower gardens, elevator entrance landscape, as well as the Garth and the north and westside areas. We try to do this on a continuous basis with a special spring and fall special clean-up to prepare the grounds for Lent and Holy Week.

Outreach is part of this commission. We support all outreach projects including the Breakfast Program, Holiday Baskets and the Post-Franklin Backpack Food initiatives. Each of these initiatives has a Chair and a core of workers. Please give your support by joining in any or all of these projects.

One of the major projects undertaken this year was to begin the restoration of the chapel. We started with the understanding that we needed to work from top down on the exterior. Water infiltration was evident almost everywhere we looked. From capstones to brick to windows, we quickly understood that we needed to have professional help. With the go-ahead of the Vestry and the Trust Committee, we established a beginning budget and moved forward. We hired Randy Case of Architecture+Design as the architect. With his expertise and guidance, we began the process of Chapel Restoration and Structural Integrity. This is Phase 1: making sure that we approach the structure before we do the aesthetics of the interior. A structural survey was done from top to bottom by Sillman Engineering and D.C. Byers Restoration and Masonry Contracting. The tentative date for starting this restoration is Spring of 2023. Your OFM Commission will keep you up to date on the progress.

#### Stewardship & Fundraising

With the worst of the Covid-19 pandemic hopefully behind us, the year 2022 saw St. Thomas move into a more comfortable financial position than the one in which we found ourselves over the two years prior. Throughout the year, the Stewardship and Fundraising Commission has endeavored to be careful and faithful stewards of the parish's resources. We look forward to working in 2023 to manage St. Thomas's current needs in a time of transition, as well as planning for a stable and sustainable future.

The commission is exceedingly grateful for the extraordinary generosity of the St. Thomas community in 2022. During the summer, we successfully completed our "Give St. Thomas a Boost" campaign, which addressed pledging shortfalls from 2021, as well as unanticipated expenses for clergy supply, bookkeeping, and insurance. Then in the fall, our annual stewardship campaign exceeded its original \$210,000 goal. Due to this, our 2023 budget does not draw as much from endowments for operating expenses as in previous years.

The vestry requested two major disbursements from endowments in 2022 for building repair and restoration. The first was for replacement of the flat roofs, which were years past the end of their useful life and in dire condition; this work was completed in the fall. The second was for preliminary work on the restoration and repair of the chapel; we expect work to begin in earnest in the spring of 2023, supported in part by a bequests and donations.

We were pleased to accept a memorial bequest from Bob Hibbard last year, which went in part toward the new mural which beautifies our nave above the door to the old sacristy. Another bequest in memory of George McKay provided a new set of Advent vestments and paraments.

Finally, the Stewardship and Fundraising Commission extends its gratitude to bookkeeper Melissa Wank for her tireless efforts since March to declutter and simplify our bookkeeping. The St. Thomas community can feel confident that their financial generosity is being accounted for professionally, following best practices.

#### 2023 Stewardship Campaign

So, we decided to raise our goal to \$225,000 and reach out to those who had yet to pledge. That proved to be a successful plan! As of December 31, 2022, we have received a total of \$224, 849.65!

When I look at the challenges that lie ahead for us, I am overwhelmed by what I've already seen. Your response shows that this parish has confidence in the future that lies beyond the transition ahead of us. We have learned the lessons Fr. Brian instilled in us. Thank you for your faith in St. Thomas.

#### **Trust Investment Committee Report & St. Thomas Trust Fund Trustees** "Growing the Trust Funds through prudent, long-term investing and Planned Giving"

St. Thomas Episcopal Church has two endowment trust funds—the St. Thomas Trust Fund and the Father Simms Trust Fund. The trust funds are invested through the guidance of the St. Thomas Investment Committee. The Trust Investment Committee discusses and monitors the performance of the funds with representatives of the Episcopal Church Foundation and State Street Bank. These discussions are held on a quarterly basis via a conference call or a Zoom meeting. The Investment Committee Chair has access to the Episcopal Church Foundation staff and up-to-date financial reports daily.

The St. Thomas Endowment Trust has five trustees: Sr. Warden Kathy Dingwall, Lori Kiess, Gillian Ebeling, Kent Bieberich, and one open position. Lori Kiess replaced Bob Harberts who resigned his position. The St. Thomas Vestry is the trustee of the Father Simms Trust.

The Trust Investment Committee members include the five trustees of the St. Thomas Endowment Trust, plus the Rector of St. Thomas and the Treasurer of St. Thomas. Father Brian has left his position on the Committee because of his leave of absence. Charles Grantier replaced Bernie Squires as Treasurer. Becky Squires serves as the Secretary for the Trustees and the Trust Investment Committee.

Under the management of the Episcopal Church Foundation and State Street Bank, the balances of the St. Thomas Trust Fund, the Father Simms Fund and Perrett Trust Fund have been combined for the purpose of investment strategies and reduced fees. The Perrett Trust Fund is independent of the St. Thomas Trust Fund and the Father Simms Trust Fund. The Perrett Fund is not addressed in this report. The trust funds remain independent trust funds with separate governance structures and with separate fund balances.

The Episcopal Church Foundation's monthly and year-end reports in addition to the St. Thomas budget reports were used to create the balances and percentages found in this annual report. These are not audited figures.

Transfers received by St. Thomas from the two trust funds and the estimated year-end balances of the two trust funds are as follows:

The 12/31/2022 decrease of the combined funds is **\$411, 877.75 (24.89%)** when compared to 12/31/2021. This amount is determined by using the totals from the above chart.

In the year of 2022, 7.22% was transferred from the St. Thomas Fund to St. Thomas Church and 10.69% was transferred from the Father Simms Fund to St. Thomas Church. (Percentages based on 2021 year-end balances.)

It is estimated that the Episcopal Church Foundation's 2022 annual investment fee was approximately .60% or around \$8,200.

The trust funds experienced a turbulent investment year in 2022. An estimated decrease of approximately \$260,0000 or 15.72% was caused by the reduction in the value of the investments within the two trust funds. Based on a January 1, 2023 "Yahoo Finance US", article, an internet news service, the S & P 500 lost 19.2% in 2022, the worst loss since 2008. The Episcopal Church Foundation and State Street Bank did adjust our investment categories to limit losses.

St. Thomas is a long-term investor. The Trustees and Investment Committee have accepted the advice of the Episcopal Church Foundation and State Street Bank to maintain our investment objectives and strategies realizing that the market does not always go up. The decreases in value do stress the importance of Planned Giving contributions and prudent withdrawals.

At the August 10, 2022 meeting of the St. Thomas Trust Fund Trustees and Trust Investment Committee the St. Thomas Trust Fund Trustees approved an additional \$40,000 for the restoration of the Chapel bringing the Chapel amount approved to \$115,000. As of December 31, 2022 nothing has been expended of the \$115,000. \$25,000 had previously been approved from non-trust fund sources to bring the available total Chapel restoration funds to \$140,000. Just under \$13,000 has been expended from the \$25,000 that is not from the St. Thomas Trust Fund. The approved \$140,000 was approved mainly for Chapel exterior restoration work. It was decided by the Trust Investment Committee and St. Thomas Trust Fund Trustees to postpone discussion regarding restoration of the Chapel interior until additional interior restoration plans are developed and additional input is obtained from assigned committees and individuals.

Also, at the August 10 meeting, the Trustees approved \$30,000 from the St. Thomas Trust Fund for the repair of the Church's flat roofs. To date the full \$30,000 has been expended. The Vestry, in its role as Trustee of the Father Simms Fund, approved \$30,000 for repair of the flat roofs. To date the full \$30,000 has been expended.

A portion of the income from the St. Thomas Endowment is divided equally between our Seminarian Fund and Holtom Scholarship Fund (each fund receives .0538%). A portion of the Fr. Simms endowment is shared with a Reserved Altar Chapter fund (.0125%).

The 2023 St. Thomas Church Operations Budget contains a request to transfer \$40,000 from the St. Thomas Trust Fund to the St. Thomas General Operations Budget. \$115,000 has been previously approved by the Trustees for Chapel restoration. The Vestry, in its role as Trustee of the Father Simms Trust Fund, approved a transfer of \$20,000 for 2023.

Most of the figures used in this report are taken from year-end reports, budget reports, and minutes from the Trustees and Trust Investment Committee meetings. St. Thomas and the Episcopal Church Foundation will refine these figures and make adjustments. Working with the Episcopal Church Foundation in previous years, indicates this process may take a month or two.
